“We Love Our Community” Luncheon – A luncheon given annually in the Church Fellowship Hall to recognize and show our appreciation to those who contribute significantly to the quality of life and work within our community. Past honorees have been the firemen, policemen, Sherriff’s Department, City and County Councils; educators in our public school system; and benevolent groups.

Projects typically involve yard cleanup, handy-man type work, minor maintenance and repairs to houses for shut-ins and the less fortunate who are unable to fund repairs. Ricks Institute. Trinity has an established relationship with The Ricks Institute in Liberia. Ricks is a Baptist school offering faith-based education to the war-torn area outside of Monrovia. Our Pastor and Ricks’ Director, Olu Menjay, have a personal friendship that has brought the Church and the school together.
